
TIPS FOR MOTORISTS

Expect bike riders. When entering the roadway, look for oncoming bicyclists. Be cautious when opening car doors.

Give at least 3 feet of space when passing. It's safer and it's the law. If you are not sure you have enough room to pass, don't.

Reduce your speed. Use special care near bicyclists, any collision with them may result in serious injury.

Understand lane positioning from the bike rider's perspective. When a lane is narrow, a bike rider may ride defensively and position themselves in the center of the lane to discourage motorists from unsafe passing.

Careful with those right and left hooks. When turning, do not turn so close the bicyclist is in danger of colliding with your vehicle.

Share the road. Bicyclists may move to the left lane to turn left, pass another vehicle, or avoid debris or parked cars.

Anticipate avoidance maneuvers by bicyclists. Bicyclists may have to swerve to avoid an opening car door or other road hazards.

Be aware. Bicyclists may give right turn signals with their right arm. A bicyclist may not have the time or bike handling skills to signal.

Be patient. Bike riders are slower and have the same rights as other slow moving vehicles. Take a few minutes to find a safe place to pass.

Be courteous. Don't let an encounter with a badly-behaved bicyclist influence your attitude towards all bicyclists.
