PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Senate Bill (SB) 1743, the Motor Vehicle Theft Prevention Act, chaptered on September 30, 1994, requires each insurance company doing business in California to pay an annual fee, not to exceed \$1, for each vehicle insured under an insurance policy it issued in the state. This legislation provided the fee be used to fund increased investigation and prosecution of economic vehicle theft, and to interdict the exportation of stolen vehicles and component parts across international borders.

As a result of the passage of SB 1743, Sections 10901 and 10902 were introduced into the California Vehicle Code (CVC). Section 10901 CVC establishes monies received, pursuant to the section, shall be used to fund enhanced programs to prevent and investigate economic automobile theft, provide a program directed at investigating and interdicting the export of stolen motor vehicles and motor vehicle components across international borders, and operate the Californians Help Eliminate Auto Theft (CAL-HEAT) program. Section 10901 CVC also requires the Department of the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to prepare an annual report to the Legislature on the use of funds (refer to Annex F). Section 10902 CVC directs the CHP to implement the CAL-HEAT program for the purpose of reducing the incidence of economic automobile theft in California. Additionally, the CHP is directed to operate a toll-free telephone hotline funded and staffed by the Department, utilizing funds pursuant to Section 10901 CVC.

EXPORTATION OF STOLEN VEHICLES AND COMPONENT PARTS

When enacting SB 1743 in 1994, the Legislature and the CHP realized stolen vehicles were being exported out of California; however, the extent of the problem or where the vehicles were being exported was unknown. In 1995, as a result of SB 1743, the CHP implemented the Foreign Export and Recovery (FEAR) program to address the vehicle exportation theft issue.

The majority of stolen vehicles exported from California are transported across the United States and Mexico border or shipped via ports along the California coastline. The Port of Los Angeles is one of the busiest seaports in North America. A significant number of stolen vehicles and stolen component parts are shipped out of the country from this port, as well as the Port of Oakland.

1-800-TELL-CHP: VEHICLE THEFT REPORTING TELEPHONE NUMBER

The 1-800-TELL-CHP vehicle theft reporting telephone number was established in 1995 as mandated by Section 10902 CVC. The telephone number provides the CHP with special programming and data collection to further enhance the Department's role in providing assistance to the public. The telephone number is answered at the CHP Office of Capital Protection Services, where Section 10902 CVC funding provides five full-time Public Safety Dispatchers (PSD) for the program. The PSDs staff the reporting line 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Tips are forwarded to the appropriate law enforcement agency or CHP Area having

primary jurisdiction. During the 2017/2018 reporting period, the telephone number received 147,585 calls.

INVESTIGATIVE TEAM FOCUS

The deployment of two CHP investigative teams was designed to concentrate efforts in areas of the state experiencing a high vehicle theft rate and exhibiting a significant probability of illegal export operations. The team's goals are to increase investigation and prosecution of economic vehicle theft, and investigate the exportation of stolen vehicles and component parts. The Northern FEAR team investigates the exportation of stolen vehicles and component parts at the Ports of Oakland and San Francisco. The Southern FEAR team investigates the exportation of stolen vehicles and component parts at the Ports of Oakland and San Francisco. The Southern FEAR team investigates the exportation of stolen vehicles and we have border and with the Ports of Los Angeles, Long Beach, and Hueneme.

ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The following is an overview of the activities and accomplishments of the FEAR investigative teams for the 2017/2018 fiscal year:

INVESTIGATIVE TEAMS

1. Northern Foreign Export and Recovery Team

The Northern FEAR team is comprised of one sergeant and four vehicle theft investigators who are based within the CHP's Golden Gate Division. The Northern FEAR team's area of investigative responsibility encompasses the geographical region of the state from Bakersfield north to the Oregon state border, and from the Pacific coastline to the Nevada state border.

The Northern FEAR team conducted 245 investigations during the 2017/2018 fiscal year, leading to the recovery of 252 stolen vehicles, with a total approximate value of \$2,383,561, and the arrest of 48 vehicle theft suspects. (Refer to Annex A, Northern Foreign Export and Recovery Team Statistics.)

The primary objectives of the Northern FEAR program are to identify and eradicate organized vehicle theft rings in the northern California region. After the rings and individuals working within the rings are identified, the Northern FEAR team investigates, makes arrests, and works with prosecutors to ensure export vehicle theft criminals are brought to justice. Additionally, the Northern FEAR investigators continually strive to create an effective and professional working relationship with pertinent governmental agencies and private industry involved with legitimate vehicle exportation; i.e., the United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), and the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB). The Northern FEAR

investigators also provide assistance to allied law enforcement agencies in northern California and neighboring states.

The Northern FEAR team reported the following significant accomplishments during the 2017/2018 fiscal year:

- •S Throughout this reporting period, the Northern FEAR team conducted businesss inspections, inspected containers at the Port of Oakland, inspected freight forwarders businesses with HSI special agents, and worked proactive enforcement details withs the Cargo Theft Interdiction Program (CTIP), Golden Gate Division investigators, thes San Mateo County Vehicle Theft Task Force, and the Alameda County Regionals Auto Theft Task Force. The team was also called upon to assist allied agencies ands other vehicle theft task forces with ongoing investigations. Team members serveds search warrants and conducted probation/parole searches as part of the Golden Gates Division Warrant Service Team. The team also provides training to CHP Areas ands allied agencies on a variety of investigative topics, including search and seizures training, as well as legal updates and current case law training.s
- •S As the CHP vehicle theft investigative team assigned to San Francisco county, thes Northern FEAR team members routinely assist San Francisco county laws enforcement agencies in conducting regular probation/parole sweeps targetings specific violators, such as gang members, sex registrants, and drug related criminals.s The team works closely with the CHP San Francisco Area and the San Mateo Countys Vehicle Theft Task Force. Team members also attend gang intelligence meetings ins Alameda and Contra Costa counties on a regular basis. The team's willingness tos assist allied agencies with various investigations has resulted in more intelligences from those agencies related to vehicle theft activity in their jurisdictions.s
- •S The Northern FEAR team was contacted by CBP regarding a vehicle being exporteds with a questionable title. A Northern FEAR team member conducted an investigations and identified the vehicle was a stolen Mercedes G63, and confirmed a false titles being used in the attempt to export the vehicle. Northern FEAR investigators haves identified suspects in numerous high-end vehicle thefts spanning three states, ands numerous port locations throughout the United States.s

The intelligence obtained in this case uncovered the method of operation used by thiss theft ring, which has led to the discovery of a Lexus SUV already exported to Africa.s The Northern FEAR team member's investigation into this vehicle determined thes vehicle was in fact a stolen vehicle using the cloned identification of a legal vehicle ins the United States. Because of this, CHP and CBP have been able to flag this vehicles and mark it for return to the United States to be given back to its lawful owner.s

•S In 2016, the Northern FEAR team began working in cooperation with the Bureau ofs Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), the United States Attorney'ss Office, San Mateo District Attorney's Office, San Francisco District Attorney'ss Office, San Francisco Police Department, Daly City Police Department, ands Redwood City Police Department on Operation Cold Day. Operation Cold Days

began by conducting street level purchases of firearms and narcotics. In March 2016, a commercial warehouse was equipped with cameras and audio recording devices, creating a controlled location for undercover officers to begin purchasing stolen cars, narcotics, and firearms.

Operation Cold Day concluded with a large-scale takedown on August 9, 2017. Over one thousand law enforcement officers participated in serving over fifty arrest warrants and forty search warrants. Approximately forty locations were searched simultaneously. During the takedown, forty-one defendants were arrested and six firearms, \$17,000 in United States currency, one half-pound of methamphetamine, and several pounds of marijuana were recovered. Overall, the two-year operation yielded 122 arrests.

The Northern FEAR team participated in over 100 undercover deals. A Northern FEAR investigator was one of the main undercover officers and successfully purchased forty-eight stolen vehicles and was present for the purchase of over one-hundred ounces of methamphetamine, nineteen ounces of cocaine, 150 Xanax pills, 560 Ecstasy pills, and 2.7 grams of heroin. As of June 1, 2018, approximately eighty-four defendants have been sentenced or pled out.

2. <u>Southern Foreign Export and Recovery Team</u>

The Southern FEAR team is comprised of one sergeant and seven vehicle theft investigators from CHP's Southern and Border Divisions, and is based within the CHP's Border Division. The Southern FEAR team's area of responsibility encompasses the geographical region of the state from south of Bakersfield to the United States and Mexico border, and from the Pacific coastline to the Arizona state border. The investigators work closely with inspectors from the CBP Outbound Enforcement Team (CBP-OET) and consistently hold joint operations. Currently, two Southern FEAR investigators are assigned to the CBP-OET, conducting examinations of vehicles set for export from Los Angeles, Long Beach, and Port Hueneme seaports.

The Southern FEAR team conducted 309 investigations during the 2017/2018 fiscal year, leading to the recovery of 447 stolen vehicles worth approximately \$6,924,634, and the arrest of 30 vehicle theft suspects. (Refer to Annex B, Southern Foreign Export and Recovery Team Statistics.)

The primary objectives of the Southern FEAR program are to identify and eradicate organized vehicle theft export rings in the southern California region. After the individuals working within the rings are identified, the investigators assigned to the Southern FEAR program investigate, arrest, and seek prosecution to ensure export vehicle theft criminals are brought to justice. The Southern FEAR investigators continually strive to create an effective and professional working relationship with pertinent governmental agencies, including CBP, HSI, Immigration and Custom Enforcement, NICB, and private-industry involved with legitimate vehicle exportation. Southern FEAR investigators provide assistance by way of support and training to

CHP Area offices and allied law enforcement agencies in southern California who are also involved with export vehicle theft investigations.

The Southern FEAR team reported the following significant accomplishments during the 2017/2018 fiscal year:

- The Southern FEAR team conducted and assisted with numerous port and outbound operations, inspected numerous containers and thousands of vehicles at the Long Beach and Los Angeles Seaports and inspected freight forwarder businesses with CBP. In addition, investigators worked proactive enforcement details with the Southern and Border Division CTIP investigators, Los Angeles Border Enforcement and Security Task Force and the CBP-OET. The team was also called upon to assist allied agencies and other vehicle theft task forces with their ongoing investigations.
- A Southern FEAR investigator, assigned to the San Diego area, was requested to assist the CHP El Cajon Area with a vehicle theft investigation. The CHP El Cajon Area units were involved in a pursuit with a stolen motorcycle. The suspect was apprehended after a minor collision. The Southern FEAR investigator interrogated the suspect and uncovered information of a local motorcycle shop that was involved in the dismantling of stolen motorcycles. During the interview, it was determined the suspect was involved in several commercial burglaries throughout the county for the purpose of committing identity theft. Southern FEAR investigators responded to the suspect's residence and located evidence linking the suspect to several unsolved burglaries. Southern FEAR investigators contacted detectives with the San Diego Police Department (SDPD) to discuss the information they had uncovered. The SDPD detectives advised the suspect's DNA had been located at several of the burglary scenes, and they were in the process of obtaining an arrest warrant. Southern FEAR investigators turned the evidence over to SDPD to include with their burglary cases. Southern FEAR investigators transported the suspect to the San Diego county jail where he was booked for the pursuit, being in possession of a firearm and auto theft related charges. In connection with this case, Southern FEAR investigators are investigating a potential chop shop suspected of dismantling stolen motorcycles.
- A Southern FEAR investigator, assigned to the United States CBP-OET at Long Beach Port discovered a 2016 Land Rover, a 2017 Land Rover, and four 2017 Mercedes GLS 450s being exported to China on fraudulent Manufacturers Statement of Origins as proof of ownership. Further investigation revealed the vehicles had been financed through fraudulent means. The financial institutions were still the rightful owners of the vehicles and were currently not receiving payments on any of the vehicles. The financial institutions had not authorized anyone to export the vehicles. Each financial institution filed stolen vehicle reports with the Southern Fear investigator. The vehicles were seized by United States Customs and eventually returned to the financial institutions. The vehicles were valued at \$513,606. The investigation involves international organized crime and is continuing.

- Southern FEAR investigators organized a countywide operation targeting motorcycle thieves. Southern FEAR investigators contacted an individual riding on a 2016 BMW S1000RR motorcycle with no license plate; throughout the contact, the rider appeared nervous. The suspect failed to provide property ownership documents for the motorcycle and was not sure who the owner was. Southern FEAR investigators conducted inquires on the motorcycle's Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) and were informed it was not reported stolen. The investigators were able to locate the motorcycle's owner at his residence and learned the motorcycle had been stolen from him earlier in the day. The suspect was subsequently arrested and transported to the San Diego county jail where he was booked for the theft of the motorcycle. The case is still pending.
- A Southern FEAR investigator, assigned to the San Diego area, was monitoring a residence suspected to be involved in criminal activity in Long Beach, CA. The residence was part of an ongoing cargo theft investigation. While the home was being monitored, a silver Dodge Grand Caravan pulled up in an alley next to the house. The driver exited the minivan and entered the property. The driver walked to the front of the residence where he was greeted by an occupant in the home. Southern FEAR investigators observed the driver pay for some items and then leave the area. A traffic stop was initiated and several boxes of stolen high-end men's shoes were located in the minivan. The driver was arrested and turned over to Border Division CTIP investigators who continued the investigation. A search warrant at the residence resulted in the recovery of hundreds of thousands of dollars in stolen merchandise.
- During warehouse inspections in Commerce, CA, Southern FEAR investigators assigned to United States CBP-OET at the Long Beach port located several stolen vehicles. Southern FEAR investigators documented all VIN numbers at two locations and forwarded them to the Daimler Financial Fraud Unit to verify financial status. A total of 34 Mercedes-Benz vehicles were reported stolen by Daimler Financial, as the vehicles in question were purchased or leased by fraudulent means. Southern FEAR investigators recovered thirty 2018 Mercedes-Benz GLS 450s, two 2017 Mercedes-Benz GLS 450s, one 2017 Mercedes-Benz S550, and one 2017 Mercedes-Benz G550. All of the Mercedes described were destined to be exported to China. All vehicles were subsequently returned to their rightful owners with an estimated recovery value totaling over \$3,033,000.

3. <u>Program Oversight and Reporting</u>

Section 10902 CVC requires the CHP to report annually on the use of funds, including salaries, expenses, purchases of equipment and supplies, and other expenditures (refer to Annex F, California Highway Patrol Senate Bill 1743 Project Expenditure Report), as well as the results achieved as a consequence of expenditures relative to the following:

- The number of investigations. (Annexes A, B, and C)
- The number of arrests. (Annexes A, B, and C)

- The number of convictions. (Annexes A, B, and C)
- The number of vehicles recovered. (Annexes A, B, and C)
- The amount of property loss recovered. (Annexes D and E)
- Program Recovery Value Annual Comparisons. (Annex E)
- The Project Expenditure Report, itemizing expenses for the fiscal year. (Annex F)

AUTOMATED LICENSE PLATE RECOGNITION PROGRAM

The CHP uses Automated License Plate Recognition (ALPR) technology as an investigative tool in the detection of wanted vehicles. Data collected by CHP ALPR systems is retained in departmental data storage servers and purged after a period of sixty days. Access to the data is limited to law enforcement personnel with an official investigatory need.

During the 2017/2018 reporting period, there were 147 data disclosures from the CHP ALPR system. Pursuant to the requirements set forth in Section 2413 CVC, information regarding these CHP ALPR data disclosures, and the agency to which the data was provided, can be found in Annex G, Automated License Plate Recognition Data Disclosures.

The CHP currently operates 177 patrol vehicles equipped with the ALPR system. These patrol vehicles have been deployed to Area offices within the eight CHP Divisions throughout the state and are used on patrol daily. The information gathered by the ALPR system is used to detect wanted vehicles and to supplement criminal investigations. During the 2017/2018 fiscal year, 409 stolen vehicles were reported recovered with the use of the ALPR system, which resulted in 102 reported arrests.

During this reporting period, there have been no changes to departmental policy affecting privacy concerns.

CONCLUSION

Vehicle theft continues to be a significant problem in California. During fiscal year 2017/2018, the FEAR teams experienced a 12.1 percent decrease in the number of combined export and economic automobile theft recoveries as compared to 2016/2017. Both the Southern and Northern FEAR teams continue to be proactive in vehicle theft reduction efforts.

The CHP FEAR teams continue to be effective as they work diligently to investigate and interdict stolen vehicles and vehicle component parts being exported across international borders. A continued emphasis by law enforcement on vehicle theft related crimes, enhanced specialized training, and the cooperative efforts by law enforcement agencies statewide will reduce this trend, as well as increase the percentage of statewide stolen vehicle recoveries and prosecutions in the future.

- Theft of a motor vehicle for financial gain.
- Reporting that a motor vehicle has been stolen for the purpose of filing a false insurance claim.
- Engaging in any act prohibited by Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 10801) of Division 4 of this code (i.e., a chop shop operation).
- Switching of vehicle identification numbers to obtain title to a stolen motor vehicle.
