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## CHAPTER 11

### DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR PROGRAM

1. INTRODUCTION. The use of Drug Recognition Evaluators (DRE) is an effective means of identifying and prosecuting drug-impaired individuals. Drug Recognition Evaluators in police work have gained acceptance and approval throughout the U.S. primarily due to their accuracy and effectiveness. With DRE training, the road patrol officer is much more likely to detect a drug-impaired individual.
  
2. HISTORY. Since 1983, the CHP has provided training to both allied agencies and departmental personnel in drug recognition. In 1991, the CHP entered into a contract with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) which established the CHP as the statewide Drug Evaluation and Classification Program Coordinator with the purpose of expanding the DRE Program nationally. Consequently, the DRE Program was certified by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) as meeting NHTSA standards.
  
3. OBJECTIVES.
  - a. Train officers to identify drug-impaired individuals.
  - b. Supplement the beat officer's belief of drug intoxication.
  - c. Ensure individuals suspected of being under the influence of drugs are evaluated in a proper and timely manner.
  - d. Provide training regarding the documentation necessary for criminal prosecution.
  - e. Assist both interstate and intrastate allied agencies by providing DRE training to their personnel.
  
4. GOAL. To increase the effectiveness of the Department and allied agencies in detecting and removing drug-impaired drivers from the highways, ultimately minimizing the loss of life, personal injury, and property damage. Furthermore, this will ensure safety and service to the public as they utilize the roadways.
  
5. PROGRAM RESPONSIBILITIES.
  - a. Enforcement and Planning Division. To ensure program objectives are met, Enforcement and Planning Division (EPD) shall oversee training, initiate program

audits, evaluate reports, and recommend to Assistant Commissioner, Staff, necessary corrective action to rectify any problems encountered.

b. Impaired Driving Section.

(1) Impaired Driving Section (IDS), Drug Evaluation and Classification Program (DECP), is designated as the Office of Primary Interest for the DRE Program and is responsible for coordinating, monitoring, and auditing the Department's participation. To comply with guidelines established by the NHTSA, a departmental statewide coordinator shall be assigned to IDS.

(2) The IDS shall:

(a) Provide assistance to Divisions for the purpose of maintaining an effective DRE Program.

(b) Coordinate DRE and DRE recertification classes for CHP and allied agency personnel as needed and ensure the guidelines set forth by the NHTSA are maintained.

(c) Make recommendations to EPD, as necessary, to rectify issues or enhance the operation of the DRE Program.

(d) Coordinate and facilitate DRE instructor courses as needed.

(e) Coordinate and facilitate annual Division coordinator meetings.

(f) Designate and establish Division DRE Field Certification sites as needed.

c. Field Divisions.

(1) Field Divisions are responsible for ensuring appropriate management and staffing of DREs. As a general rule, the appropriate staffing level of DREs for each Division shall be based on an identified need (i.e., total number of DRE evaluations). To comply with these guidelines, Division commanders shall designate a Division DRE coordinator who will act as a liaison to IDS, DECP.

(2) Field Divisions shall also coordinate recertification for CHP and allied agency personnel, as needed. To ensure compliance with the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST), Division DRE coordinators shall notify the DECP 45 days prior to the scheduled date of the recertification class. Division DRE coordinators shall forward the completed POST rosters to the DECP within five business days of the completion of the class.

(3) Field Divisions should maintain a minimum of one field certification site or establish a joint certification site through coordination with an adjacent Division. The DECP shall coordinate establishment of new field certification sites within Divisions. All field certification sites should be staffed with a minimum of two DRE instructors. Refer to paragraph 9. of this chapter for field certification site management guidelines.

(4) On a quarterly basis, field Divisions shall compile the following statistics from each Area within their command and report to IDS within 45 days after the last day of the quarter. This information will assist IDS in determining the effectiveness of the DECP.

(a) Total number of DREs.

(b) Total number of DRE examinations.

(c) Total number of DRE examinations which resulted in an opinion of the suspect being under the influence.

(d) Total number of urine and blood samples collected by DREs.

(e) Total number of urine and blood samples returned from the laboratory.

(f) Of the urine and blood samples returned from the laboratory, the total number of DRE opinions which were affirmed by a toxicology report.

(5) Field Divisions should monitor the effectiveness of the DRE Program at each Area.

d. Areas.

(1) Monitor the activities of DREs to evaluate their effectiveness and ensure the most effective use of deployment. To comply with these guidelines, Area commanders shall designate a uniformed officer as the Area DRE coordinator who will act as a liaison with the Division. It is recommended the commander choose the person who has the most DRE training (i.e., a DRE instructor or a DRE).

(2) Negotiate with the appropriate Division commanders regarding the justification of additional DREs.

(3) Ensure the DRE staffing level is commensurate with the Area's needs. Collect and review all completed CHP 202DREs, Drug Recognition Evaluation

(see Annex A). These forms should be reviewed by a DRE or a DRE instructor.

- (4) Maintain a copy of each CHP 202DRE for four years.
- (5) Maintain a log of each DRE's evaluations and toxicology results.
- (6) Develop and maintain a standard operating procedure (SOP) to include the following:
  - (a) Identification of facilities conducive for DRE examinations (e.g., facilities that have a dark room to conduct eye examinations).
  - (b) Scheduling of DREs.
  - (c) Call-out procedures.
  - (d) Requests from adjoining CHP Areas and allied agencies for DREs.
- (7) Review all DRE evaluations to ensure proper documentation and accuracy of quarterly statistics.
- (8) On a quarterly basis, report the following information to Division within 30 days after the last day of the quarter:
  - (a) Total number of DREs.
  - (b) Total number of DRE evaluations.
  - (c) Total number of DRE evaluations which resulted in an opinion of the suspect being under the influence.
  - (d) Total number of urine and blood samples collected by DREs.
  - (e) Total number of urine and blood samples returned from the laboratory.
  - (f) Of the urine and blood samples returned from the laboratory, the total number of DRE opinions which were affirmed by the toxicology report.
- (9) Review DRE curriculum vitae and rolling logs annually.
- (10) Ensure the NHTSA National Drug Recognition Expert Data System is being used by each DRE to log evaluations.
- (11) Provide DRE instructors to assist with DRE classes.

6. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR RESPONSIBILITIES.

- a. Perform DRE evaluations upon the request of CHP and allied agency personnel. The DRE shall complete a full evaluation (i.e., if a DRE evaluation is conducted and it is determined the person is not under the influence of drugs, the DRE shall still complete a CHP 202DRE). All DRE evaluations shall be entered into the National DRE Tracking System managed by the NHTSA.
- b. Maintain state-issued equipment (blood pressure cuff, stethoscope, pupilometer cards, digital thermometer, and DRE manuals).
- c. Maintain a current and updated curriculum vitae and rolling log (refer to Annex B, CHP 202C, Influence Evaluations). Based on national standards, DREs may be decertified for not having a current curriculum vitae and rolling log available for review.
- d. It is the responsibility of each individual DRE to maintain their certification status pursuant to IACP standards. (Refer to paragraph 12. of this chapter.)
- e. Comply with departmental policy contained within this chapter.

7. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR SELECTION GUIDELINES.

- a. It is imperative that a stringent DRE selection process be uniformly applied and maintained to ensure the most qualified DREs are selected. Area commanders have the right to approve or deny candidates. However, the DECP has the final approval in the selection process.
- b. The DRE should normally be selected from the rank of sergeant or officer. The following criteria should be considered in the selection of a DRE:
  - (1) Commitment to serve as a DRE for a minimum of two years.
  - (2) Understands the expectations of the DECP.
  - (3) Effectively interacts with CHP, allied agency, and judicial personnel.
  - (4) Has a minimum of one year of road patrol experience. This guideline should not preclude Area commanders from selecting a candidate deemed to possess the best overall qualifications.
  - (5) Not assigned to a headquarters, Division, or special duty assignment.
  - (6) Number of driving under the influence/drug arrests the officer has completed.

(7) Willingness to work various shifts to provide proper staffing of DREs.

(8) Ratings of proficient or above in all critical tasks on their last CHP 118S, Performance Appraisal - Sergeant/CHP 118, Performance Appraisal - Officer.

8. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR TRAINING. The Department utilizes the training guidelines set forth by the NHTSA and certified by the IACP. Each DRE is required to successfully complete the classroom instruction and field certification process within 90 days. Additionally, the DRE must recertify by attending an eight-hour refresher course biennially and complete four evaluations.

9. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR FIELD CERTIFICATION.

a. Supervisors and officers shall ensure field certifications are conducted in a manner which is consistent with existing laws and complies with departmental policy and procedures. Allied agency personnel shall be briefed as to the expectations of their conduct.

b. All participants shall be aware of the safety risks associated with dealing with intravenous drug users.

c. Participants shall be cognizant of the special societal needs faced by addicts and be willing to assist with seeking social services, if desired by the arrestee. When possible, field certification managers should contact local social services agencies and invite them to attend field certifications and assist arrestees interested in obtaining social services.

d. Student DREs shall be directly supervised by a certified DRE instructor during all phases of training. Instructors will ensure local protocol is followed for arrests, detention, evaluations, and booking of subjects. Instructors will supervise the use and maintenance of facilities used for this training.

e. A lead DRE instructor should be selected by the DECP based upon their training, expertise, maturity, and judgment for each field certification event.

(1) The lead DRE instructor should function as an event supervisor and is responsible for ensuring all personnel participating in certifications comply with the contents of this chapter.

(2) The on-duty shift supervisor or officer in charge (OIC) should be notified by the DRE instructor regarding the training in the command and should ensure notification is made to the appropriate communications center.

- (3) Any unusual circumstances or occurrences shall be immediately reported by the lead DRE instructor to the on-duty supervisor/OIC or on-call manager.
  - (4) Required reports such as the CHP 121, Employer's Report of Occupational Injury or Illness, and the CHP 216, Arrest – Investigation Report, shall be completed by the DRE sergeant or affected personnel as appropriate.
- f. The appropriate reports shall be completed for all subjects (e.g., CHP 202, Driving Under the Influence Arrest - Investigation Report; CHP 202DRE; CHP 215, Notice to Appear).
  - g. Subjects charged with crimes shall either be booked into jail or cited and released pursuant to the Area SOP.
  - h. Subjects determined not to be in violation of the law shall be released pursuant to California Penal Code Section 849(b), in accordance with Highway Patrol Manual (HPM) 100.69, General Law Enforcement Policy Manual and the Area SOP. A DRE instructor must verify the subject is not under the influence prior to release.
  - i. The lead DRE instructor shall ensure a blood, urine, or oral fluid sample is collected from subjects determined to be under the influence and tested. Following testing, the samples shall be booked per departmental policy.
  - j. Officers who are not certified as a DRE may be assigned to assist DRE instructors with the arrests and booking of subjects involved in this training. These designated officers will be directed in their activities by the lead DRE instructor and shall adhere to departmental policy and local procedures.
  - k. Immediately following the confirmation of toxicology results, the DRE instructors shall complete and forward the IACP Drug Evaluation and Classification Certification Progress Log (Annex C) to the DECP. The instructor shall attach the following to the progress log:
    - (1) A photocopy of every CHP 202DRE and narrative report.
    - (2) A photocopy of every toxicology report that corresponds with every CHP 202DRE.
    - (3) The DRE student's completed Certification Knowledge examination.
  - l. Upon completion of the DRE classroom and field certifications, the DECP will send copies of the IACP Drug Evaluation and Classification Certification Progress Log, or IACP Drug Evaluation and Classification Program Instructor Certification Progress Log (Annex D) to the IACP. Within six months, the IACP will provide certificates and cards to the DECP; the certificates and cards will be forwarded by

electronic mail to the DREs. It is the responsibility of the DRE to ensure a copy of the certificate is placed in their personnel file.

10. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR INSTRUCTOR RESPONSIBILITIES. The DRE instructor shall aid with classroom instruction, field certifications, and biennial recertifications as requested.

11. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR INSTRUCTOR SELECTION GUIDELINES. It is imperative that a stringent DRE instructor selection process be uniformly applied and maintained to ensure the most qualified DRE instructors are selected. The following criteria should be considered in the selection of a departmental DRE instructor:

- a. The DRE instructor should normally be selected from the rank of officer or sergeant.
- b. All DRE instructor candidates shall complete a DRE instructor application and submit it through channels, to their appropriate Division coordinator. The Division coordinator will forward the approved applications to the DECP for final selection by the statewide DRE coordinator.
- c. Two years of experience as a DRE.
- d. Desire to perform the duties of a DRE instructor.
- e. Demonstrated ability to detect people under the influence of drugs.
- f. Strong interpersonal and communication skills.
- g. Experience in courtroom testimony as an expert in drug-influence cases.

12. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR RECERTIFICATION. Recertification is necessary to ensure DREs and DRE instructors maintain proficiency by utilizing the standards set forth by the NHTSA and certified by the IACP.

- a. Drug Recognition Evaluator certification is valid for a two-year period from the date which is dictated by the IACP's receipt of the student's completed IACP Drug Evaluation and Classification Certification Progress Log. The expiration of the DRE's certification will be noted on the IACP certification card issued to the DRE.
- b. Each DRE shall demonstrate continued proficiency every two years by:
  - (1) Performing a minimum of four acceptable evaluations since the last date of expiration noted on their IACP DRE card.

(2) Completing a minimum of eight hours of recertification training since the date of the DRE's most recent certification.

(3) Submitting a photocopy of their current curriculum vitae and rolling log to the DRE instructor providing recertification training for review and forwarding to the DECP.

NOTE: To maintain DRE instructor certification, every instructor shall teach a minimum of eight hours per year in a drug-related class or assist with instruction at a DRE field certification site. Instructors must also attend the annual DRE Instructor Update Course.

c. After completion of a recertification class, the DRE instructor shall forward photocopies of each attending DRE's current curriculum vitae, rolling log, and a completed IACP Drug Evaluation and Classification Program Recertification and Assurances form (Annex F), with the original class roster to the DECP. The DECP will review, process, and forward recertification forms to the IACP.

13. TERMINATION DURING DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR TRAINING. The following circumstances may result in termination from the DRE Program:

a. Does not successfully complete the pre-school examination or final examination with a minimum passing score of at least 80 percent.

b. Misses more than eight hours of classroom training.

c. Does not complete field certification training within 60-90 days of completing the classroom portion of the training. Does not satisfactorily complete a minimum of 12 drug evaluations involving three separate drug categories during the field certification training.

d. Voluntarily withdraws during training.

e. The trainee performs any inappropriate acts that bring discredit upon the Department or the DECP.

f. An instructor recommends termination at field certification.

14. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR INSTRUCTOR TRAINING. The Department utilizes the training guidelines set forth by the NHTSA and certified by the IACP. The DRE instructor is required to successfully complete the classroom instruction, supervise two field certifications, and teach a minimum of two hours in the classroom portion of a DRE class.

15. CAUSE FOR TERMINATION DURING INSTRUCTOR TRAINING. The following circumstances may result in termination from the DRE Program:

- a. Students who miss more than four hours of instruction.

NOTE: A student who misses more than four hours of instruction shall repeat the course. A student missing less than four hours of classroom instruction shall be required to complete the missed portion under the guidance and approval of the DRE course manager. Students shall not be permitted to “test out” of portions of the training, nor shall they be permitted to attend only those portions of the course that they have not previously completed.

- b. Does not supervise two field certifications performed by candidate DREs during field certification training within 90 days. (Only the DECP statewide coordinator has the authority to approve an additional 90 days.)
- c. Does not teach a minimum of two hours in the classroom portion of a drug-related class within 90 days. (Only the DECP statewide coordinator has the authority to approve an additional 90 days.)
- d. The trainee voluntarily withdraws from training.
- e. The trainee performs any inappropriate acts that bring discredit upon the Department or the DECP.

16. REMOVAL/DECERTIFICATION FROM THE DRUG EVALUATION AND CLASSIFICATION PROGRAM.

- a. Voluntary Removal. Upon submitting a CHP 51, Memorandum, by the DRE, they may be removed from the DECP. A copy of the memorandum shall be placed in their personnel file. The original shall be forwarded to the DECP. An additional copy of the memorandum shall remain in the DRE’s training file. Any DRE who requests to be voluntarily removed prior to completing their two-year obligation should not be selected to serve as a DRE for a minimum of three years.
- b. Involuntary Removal. A memorandum shall be issued to the DRE stating the reason(s) they have been removed and decertified from the DECP. A copy of the memorandum shall be placed in their personnel file. The original shall be forwarded to the DECP. An additional copy of the memorandum shall remain in the former DRE’s training file. Any DRE who is involuntarily removed prior to completing their two-year obligation should not be selected to serve as a DRE in the future. The following situations shall be sufficient cause for a DRE to be removed and decertified from the DECP:

- (1) Substandard performance.
- (2) Improper and inaccurate documentation of DRE evaluations.
- (3) Refusing to perform DRE evaluations.
- (4) Insufficient use of DRE skills.
- (5) Failure to successfully complete biennial recertification.
- (6) Any inappropriate acts on the part of the DRE that bring discredit upon the Department or the DECP.

#### 17. REINSTATEMENT OF A DECERTIFIED DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR AND DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR INSTRUCTOR.

- a. The Department utilizes the training guidelines set forth by the NHTSA and certified by the IACP. The IACP requires a written request for reinstatement to the DRE Program from the applicant to the appropriate coordinator, through the proper agency channels. All CHP coordinators are cautioned to conduct a thorough check on the cause of the applicant's decertification and the reason for their application for reinstatement.
- b. An individual can be reinstated as a DRE when the following conditions are met:
  - (1) The applicant must pass a 100-item examination, witnessed by a certified DRE instructor, with a minimum score of 80 percent.
  - (2) The applicant must complete four hands-on drug evaluations within a one-year period from the date of request to be reinstated. The evaluations shall be witnessed by a DRE instructor.
  - (3) The DRE instructor shall complete the Drug Recognition Expert Reinstatement or Reactivation Form (Annex E) and forward a photocopy of the DRE's curriculum vitae and rolling log to the IDS.
  - (4) The applicant's eligibility and reinstatement as a DRE is reviewed and approved by the Department's DRE coordinator, the state coordinator from the Office of Traffic Safety, and the IACP's Technical Advisory Panel Regional coordinator, where applicable.
- c. An individual can be reinstated as a DRE instructor when the following conditions are met:

(1) The applicant meets conditions set forth in paragraphs 17.b.(1)-(3) above, and is reinstated as a DRE.

(2) The applicant's eligibility and reinstatement as a DRE instructor is reviewed and approved by the Department's DRE coordinator, the state coordinator, and the IACP's Technical Advisory Panel Regional coordinator, where applicable.

#### 18. EQUIPMENT.

a. Each DRE will be issued the following equipment:

(1) Stethoscope.

(2) Sphygmomanometer (blood pressure cuff).

(3) Pupilometer, Drug Recognition Evaluator cards (CHP 386B).

(4) Digital thermometer and covers.

(5) Approved penlight.

(6) A tablet and accessories, when available.

#### 19. ATTIRE AND VEHICLES.

a. During classroom training, all CHP personnel shall wear business casual attire.

b. Due to the training required during field certifications, officers' departmental uniforms may become soiled or damaged. Uniformed personnel may wear the utility uniform which consists of the two-piece blue utility uniform. The use of civilian attire is not authorized.

c. Only marked law enforcement vehicles shall be utilized during field evaluations. Specialized multi-passenger vehicles may be utilized for prisoner and officer transportation.

d. Personnel assigned to task forces must adhere to the departmental uniform and grooming standards as outlined in HPM 73.5, Uniform/Grooming and Equipment Standards, unless otherwise indicated.

20. RECORDS MAINTENANCE/DOCUMENTATION.

a. Activity Tracking System. Drug Recognition Evaluators shall document their DRE time in the Activity Tracking System (ATS). Certified DREs entering evaluations into ATS should select “DRE Drug Evaluation” from the Primary Activity dropdown menu and complete the Impairment Information section, including:

- (1) Party Type. Select the most appropriate party type.
- (2) Suspected Impairment Cause. Select any/all that apply.
- (3) Chemical Test Completed. Select any/all that apply. If no chemical test was obtained, leave the box unchecked.

NOTE: The Impairment Information section for the CHP 202 and the DRE activity code capture different information. As such, the CHP 202 and the DRE Drug Recognition Evaluation must be entered in the Primary Activity dropdown menu and cannot be entered in the Additional Activity dropdown menu.

b. Reports. All DRE evaluations shall be conducted and documented using the NHTSA/IACP 12-step evaluation process and report format. Any deviation should be documented and explained in the CHP 202DRE report.

21. DRUG RECOGNITION EVALUATOR MANAGER SOFTWARE.

a. Certified DREs should use the DRE Manager software program to complete their CHP 202DRE evaluations. The DRE Manager software program is available to all certified DREs for download using the departmental Software Center. The DRE Manager software program allows DREs to complete their evaluations electronically and submit required information to the NHTSA.

NOTE: For best results, certified DREs should use a departmentally issued tablet to complete their evaluations. However, the DRE Manager software program can work on other departmental computers.

b. Certified DREs who have not been trained on the use of the DRE Manager software should contact IDS at (916) 843-4360. Impaired Driving Section can answer general questions about the software and provide appropriate training materials.

c. In the event a certified DRE cannot access the DRE Manager software program, they may complete their evaluation using a CHP 202DRE available in the forms library located on the CHP Intranet site. In these cases, DREs will also be

required to enter their information on the NHTSA DRE Data System Web site at <https://dredata.nhtsa.gov/login/auth>.

d. All DRE evaluations entered in the NHTSA DRE Data System Web site should use a YY-TYE-TEMC format, where YY is the current year, TYE is the total number of evaluations in the current year, and TEMC is the total number of evaluations in the DRE's career.





